It's so good to be back doing what we all love. It's now 23 months since my last show, 23 very long months. I've never had such a long break in my theatrical career. Not just back, but with lovely big audiences and the bar refurbished and open again! We've had a great time these last few weeks rehearsing, such a joy to have the Barn back in full operation, with three shows rehearsing simultaneously and auditions taking place. Life and the theatre are getting back to normal.



And we have a gem of a show, a little performed John Godber piece, written with much love about his grandparents. *Happy Jack* has had the longest genesis of any show I've been involved with. We originally started rehearsing a companion piece called *September in the Rain*, with a group of six, to be performed online and with a limited socially distanced audience. We had to pause rehearsals when lockdown 2 started. When we were ready to resume, the cast, Simon and Mary, had diligently learnt all the lines, only to be told, sorry but we're now doing *Happy Jack* due to a licensing problem. Now Simon and Mary know both of John Godber's plays about his grandparents...

Happy Jack tells the story of his grandparents, Jack and Liz's lives in reverse order, working from their deaths to their first date. Jack was a hard-working miner devoted to his wife and family; Liz an overworked, tired and depressed housewife. The play is in parts gritty, sad, sentimental and funny, a rollercoaster ride through the emotions. A story though that will resonate with many, with the routine of daily life only broken by a week's holiday in the British rain.

Myself and the cast and crew are so pleased you've come to support us and the theatre, and to see some drama, how it should be, performed live. Enjoy the show.

JOHN GODBER

John was born the son of a miner in Upton, West Yorkshire. He trained as a teacher of drama at Bretton Hall College. Whilst he was Head of Drama at Minsthorpe High School, the school he attended as a student, he won every major award at the National Student Drama Festival between 1981 and 1983.

John's plays are numerous and include: *Bouncers, Up 'n' Under, April in Paris, Teechers, Blood, Sweat and Tears, Cramp, September*

in the Rain and of course, *Happy Jack*, and are performed across the world. He has the distinction of being one of the most performed writers in the English language. He has won numerous awards for his plays, including a Laurence Olivier Award and seven Los Angeles Drama Critics Circle Awards.

John was Artistic Director of Hull Truck for 26 years, taking it from bankruptcy in 1984 to its new home in a £15 million theatre in 2010.

In 2011, he set up *The John Godber Company* with his playwright wife, Jane, and formed a partnership with Theatre Royal Wakefield to produce two tours of his work each year.


Since then his plays have continued to tour the UK and have been seen by over 200,000 people.

The Director Steve Thompson writes...

"Thirty years ago I was a member of the Barn's play selection committee. Every year we spent weeks meticulously putting together they Barn's season of plays. On one occasion we got into a heated discussion about a particular play...was it too racy? Was there too much sex and violence for our delicate-natured audiences to handle?

I recall Eric Farlie (then Chair of the Barn) making an impassioned plea...Drama, he said, should not always take the safe path. Sometimes it has to <image><section-header><section-header><text><text>

be challenging, even dangerous. And then he said something which has stayed with me ever since ... he said 'I can't believe the Barn has never done Equus'. Thirty years later, Eric, the company has finally got around to it..."

'Equus' is the story of a young adolescent who commits an act of unspeakable violence; it's the story of the psychiatrist who tries to unravel the complex puzzle of the boy's obsessions.
