From the Chairman

Welcome to the Barn Theatre for the first production of our 50th anniversary season.

I can think of no better play to mark this anniversary than *The Cruable* – one of the most iconic plays written in the English language in the 20th century.

Written in 1953 by American playwright Arthur Miller, it is a dramatised and partially fictionalised story of the Salem witch trials that took place in the Massachusetts Bay Colony from 1692 to 1693. Miller wrote the play as an allegory for McCarthyism, when the United States government persecuted people accused of being communists. Miller was questioned by the House of Representatives' Committee on Un-American Activities in 1956 and convicted of contempt of Congress for refusing to identify others present at meetings he had attended.

As the starter piece for our anniversary season it combines many things that make us such a lovely community. The cast is made up of a number of old and new faces, and we offer a warm welcome to our new director, Max Lewendel. The actors range in age from young teens to more senior members, with many more decades' experience. Our committed backstage team have worked over the summer to bring the Barn a play that we all love. Often performed in amateur theatre, *The Crucible* has just as much relevance now as it ever did. Themes of love, politics, lies, delusion and religious fervour are carefully woven together in a piece that is as intricate and beautiful as the finest lace.

As a community of volunteers, we are always looking for new faces to get involved, even if it's only in a small way. If acting's not for you there are lots of backstage roles where you can become part of the team and enjoy putting together a production for everyone. We don't expect anyone to walk straight in as a stage manager – we'll ease you in, with lots of opportunities to learn the ropes and try a few things out and see what you enjoy. If the idea appeals to you, have a chat to one of the Barn members helping out this evening, and they'll put you in touch with someone to find out more.

Having played the angry Marco in A View from the Bridge, he's now playing the angry Parris in The Crucible, demonstrating his full range! He has recently performed in The Red Shoes at the Barn and A Midsummer Night's Dream at the Queen Mother Theatre in Hitchin.

Keith Thompson - GILES COREY

Making his first appearance on the Barn stage in 1964, Keith has acted in or directed nearly 150 productions here, including many Barn festival successes all over the country, and has served three terms as Chairman of the Club. He now also serves as a GoDA Adjudicator.

Anne Woolmington - REBECCA NURSE

Anne first appeared on the Barn stage in 1955 and over the years has enjoyed playing many serious and comedy roles. She also helps backstage, prompting and working with the Barn's wardrobe team.

Colin Macleod - THOMAS PUTNAM

Colin has been a member of the Barn since 2011 and this is his ninth production. He is also co-editor of the monthly Barn News. Prior to joining the Barn he was a member of the Knebworth Amateur Theatrical Society for over 30 years.

Adrienne Perry - ANN PUTNAM

Adrienne has been a Barn member for 11 years. Although she's taken a five-year hiatus from the Barn she's not stopped acting and has performed with the Digswell Players, recently winning an award for her role in A Bunch of Amateurs.

Mark Skrebels - JUDGE JOHN HATHORNE

Mark has been a member of the the Barn for around 10 years and also performs with other companies. His last role was Reggie in *Quartet* at CoPs, and before that he played Frank in 84 Charing Cross Road at the Barn. Mark also does the odd bit of film work and was Michael Keaton's double in Tim Burton's remake of *Dumbo*. Mark's recently been picked up by an acting agency, but to pay the mortgage (until his big break comes!) he's a management consultant.

Joey Butcher - George Herrick

Joey has been a Barn member since he was 11 years old. He's performed in a number of productions including *Alice* at the Minack Theatre and last year's Youth Drama Festival entry *Little Wings* which won the anniversary award. Joey is currently at college studying IT and Game Design.

Keith Macdougall - FRANCIS NURSE

Keith has previously performed in comedy sketches for student revue shows at the Edinburgh Festival Fringe (some decades ago) and more recently in several drama productions 'up North' including once playing the soldier hero Sergius in Shaw's *Arms and the Man*. This is Keith's debut appearance at the Barn.

Olivia Breeze - BETTY PARRIS

Olivia's acting debut was at the age of 8, playing Flora in *The Innocents* at the Barn. She has since appeared in several Barn shows and has performed twice at the famous Minack Theatre in Cornwall – *Nicholas Nickleby* in 2016 and *Alice* in 2018. Her role in *The Crucible* carries on the family tradition from her dad and grandma who have both been in previous productions of this great play at the Barn.

Georgia Burgess - MERCY LEWIS

Georgia is currently studying acting at Hitchin College and has ambition to take up acting professionally. This is not only Georgia's debut at the Barn but it is also her first time performing on a public stage having only previously performed in school productions, including playing Dorothy in *The Wizard of Oz*.

Katherine Steed - SUSANNAH WALCOTT

Having previously trained as a stage manager with the National Youth Theatre, Katherine joined the Barn in 2017 and has recently become the social media officer for the theatre. Her notable roles include Eliza Doolittle in *Pygmalion*, Alais in *The Lion in Winter* and Alonna in last season's *Boudica*. This year she choreographed for *I*, *Don Quixote* at the Minack and hopes to do more in future.

Kizzie Hopkinson - Abigail Williams

Kizzie returns to the Barn after completing a foundation in acting at the Oxford School of Drama. She has performed in a range of amateur and professional productions, for both stage and screen, including *Macbeth* and *The Merry Wives of Windsor* at the 70th Pendley Shakespeare festival this summer. She's delighted to be back at the Barn in a pivotal role she has long dreamed of playing.

Alice Smithson - ELIZABETH PROCTOR

Alice normally performs with the Lytton Players and has been in shows such as Wuthering Heights and Twelfth Night. After a year's break doing her masters in Animation, Alice makes her Barn debut in a challenging and different role for her.

Simon Parr - Judge George Danforth

Simon was planning on taking a short break after dying twice a night in *Boudica*, but the opportunity to work in this marvellous play was too good to resist. Delighted to get a role he has long coveted, he's even more pleased to have half the play off.

Matt Hughes-Short - REV. JOHN HALE

Matt trained at the Southern Theatre Arts Centre in Brighton. He performed in a variety of amateur and professional productions across the south coast before moving to Hertfordshire in 2018. Recent credits include Butterflies are Free and Ben-Hur for Company of Ten and Modern Dance for Beginners for Duality Theatre Company. He is delighted to be making his debut at the Barn.

Jaysica Marvell - TITUBA

Jaysica started performing in amateur productions nine years ago, playing a variety of roles including Maria in Twelfth Night, Flavia/Belinda in Noises Off and Charlie Cheswick in One Flew over the Cuckoo's Nest. Playing Tituba will be the first time she's acted on the Barn stage. Jaysica is a busy mum to her two daughters and has recently completed her Masters Degree in Film and Television Studies.

A note from the Director

Welcome to the Barn Theatre's 50th Anniversary production. I'm honoured to be chosen to direct this 1953 Tony award-winning play to mark this seminal occasion in our theatre's history. I've wanted to direct this play since school and am excited to bring this production back to the Barn, with something new – and unsettlingly familiar – to say for our modern times.

The world of Salem in the 17th century was one of Puritan repression and patriarchal dominance. Women had their place. When young girls with minds of their own began exploring their femininity by dancing in the woods – and when their games could not be understood by the men of the town – the only explanation that anyone would accept was witchcraft.

Witchcraft has been found in all cultures, from the ancient Greeks to the modern American South. Witches have delivered our babies, comforted our sick, counselled our fearful and punished our cruel. Throughout history the practices of witches have been precursors to medicine, science and psychology. But in the medieval church the crafts of midwives and healers became demonised. The art of finding, torturing and murdering women (and men) became law and common practice into the 17th century.

Modern witches have beliefs, practices and customs often wildly divergent from each other, but they are united by their love of forbidden lore and their need to forge their own spiritual and ritual traditions. And for this, women (and children) today, in India, Africa, Saudia Arabia and many more, are still hunted, tried and executed as witches.

When The Crucible was written, the 'witches' allegory was that of Communism: it was the secret evil lurking in the woods and a mere accusation was enough to destroy lives. Anyone 'different' was labelled a Communist, and this was seen as evil, without any knowledge of what the word actually meant.

Now other groups are seen as evil: immigrants, the LGBT community, the poor, those who identify as BAME, feminists... All suffer repression. All – in one way or another – are told to keep in their place.

And the propaganda - once again - comes from within our own borders.

More than any time since the 1950s, this is a story relevant for now.
