14th – 22nd April at 8pm I don't know what your game is, but you need to pack your bag.


A gripping modern thriller, adapted by Lucinda Coxon from the bestselling novel by Harriet Lane.



ROBERT LOUIS STEVENSON

A LIFE OF ADVENTURE AND IMAGINATION

Robert Louis Stevenson was a Scottish writer born in 1850 in Edinburgh. He grew up in a family of lighthouse engineers and attended the University of Edinburgh to study engineering himself, but his love for literature proved stronger, and he began pursuing a career in writing. Stevenson's early

life was characterised by struggles with health issues, including chronic respiratory illness, which would plague him for the rest of his life. Despite these challenges, Stevenson pursued his passion for literature, becoming one of the most celebrated authors of his time.

Stevenson was a prolific writer, penning numerous novels, short stories, essays and poetry throughout his career. His most famous works include *Treasure Island*, *Kidnapped*, *The Strange Case of Dr Jekyll and Mr Hyde*, and *The Black Arrow*. Stevenson's works have captivated generations of readers, leaving a profound impact on the literary world.

Treasure Island, originally published as a serial in the children's magazine *Young Folks* between 1881 and 1882, remains Stevenson's most famous work. The thrilling tale of pirates, buried treasure and adventure has captured the imagination of countless readers and has been adapted into various forms of media, including plays, films and television series.

Bryony Lavery's adaptation brings this Stevenson classic to life in a fresh and exciting way. The play explores the themes of betrayal, loyalty and the pursuit of riches while showcasing the dynamic characters that have made *Treasure Island* a perennial favourite. The play remains true to the novel's setting, beginning at the Admiral Benbow Inn, where young Jim encounters the mysterious Billy Bones and becomes embroiled in a dangerous quest for treasure.
